

Hello Dear Friends,

What a gorgeous display of beauty we are enjoying this autumn. Although it is a prelude to winter, still I am reminded of Jesus' words in Matthew 6:25-27 "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And which of you by worrying can add a single hour to your span of life?"

Recently many of us walked together down the road in Chatfield Hollow State Park as part of the Haddam-Killingworth Crop Walk, a fundraiser to address world hunger. It was a gorgeous day for a walk in the woods and we enjoyed fellowship together and our common concern for food scarcity, both in our town and beyond. As it was also World Communion Day, I felt some solidarity with Christians around the world. It seemed a very fitting way to extend our communion beyond our church community.

What does communion mean? When we gather around the communion table, we remember the words of Christ at the Last Supper, where with friends, he gave thanks for food and drink, and after blessing it, asked that he be remembered in this way, as we eat and drink from the gifts of God's bounty.

Through our prayers, the bread and wine of our symbolic meal become a living spiritual sustenance that nourishes our spiritual journeys. Fused into this is every meaningful moment we have shared around the table with family and friends and the understanding that life is built of these precious moments together. Communion is an act of hope for sharing meals that nourish body, mind, and spirit. We take a moment to enjoy our memories of the love that binds us in community, anchored by our thanksgiving to God for the many blessings that shape our lives.

By walking together in the Crop Walk to raise funds and awareness for those suffering from hunger, we extended our communion prayer to include those around the world without meals, and we lived Jesus' mandate to "Feed the People."

On this same day, one of our long-standing church and choir members, Norm Manning, was also enjoying God's beauty displayed in its glorious autumnal array. After sharing his meal with family and stacking firewood, he decided to cut through the Cockaponset woods to get home. He had done this before successfully, and he had done it before unsuccessfully. On the unsuccessful time, he had found the road and a house and knocked on the door, asked to use the phone, and called for a ride home. Matter of fact, no worry or fuss, Norm invested himself fully into his moments with family, the farm, and God's beauty in the woods. And while the community spent days searching, worrying, and praying, Norm was already safely home in God's hand.

While we are missing Norm, he is still helping us to remember that we are all already safely in God's hand. Even when we are suffering from physical illness or emotional distress, we are sheltered and protected in God's care. We are always already safely in God's hand.

We are also always a part of a larger communion, even in our loneliest moments. This communion includes the saints and prophets from times of old, as well as those around the world who choose to nourish themselves with the word of God. God's word is written in the fabric of our beings and in the fabric of the universe. We are given the beauty of this earth. We are given so many moments of life to share with each other. We are given the love of God that binds the universe and calls us each by our own names.

As we prepare for winter, may we remember the meaning of communion, and celebrate our thanksgiving for this communion together.

May the peace of Christ dwell in your heart.

For our November Music Corner, I've decided to give a little bit of an overview of the three hymnals that we use to support congregational singing in our sanctuaries. Since the moment I began substituting at UCCHH, I have heard varying feedback

about each hymnal, and I began to investigate the history of these hymnals. I did not grow up in the UCC Church, so I was not familiar with any of the hymnals.

The Pilgrim Hymnal was originally published in 1935, with a revision in 1958. Although we own several copies of the 1935 version, which are stored at Lewis House, these books are not generally in circulation anywhere. The 1958 version of the Pilgrim hymnal is the one that can be found in the pews of the UCCHH. You may have noticed that the Pilgrim hymnals at the south campus have a blue cover and the Pilgrim hymnals at the north campus have a red cover. Aside from the color of the outer cover, these books are identical. All of the contents of the 1958 hymnal were collected prior to 1950, from various hymn sources. The Pilgrim hymnal contains a mix of American hymns and music that was previously published in earlier hymnals. The American music in the Pilgrim hymnal was a mix of intentionally composed sacred music and spirituals that were documented (written down) during the early part of the twentieth century. The Pilgrim Hymnal had a strong emphasis on congregational singing and reflects the cultural and theological context of the early twentieth century.

The Pilgrim Hymnal remained the stand-alone hymnal in most UCC churches until 1974 when the Hymnal of the United Church of Christ was published. We have approximately 40 copies of this hymnal stored at Lewis House. The Hymnal of the United Church of Christ became unpopular within just a few years of its publication and the UCC general synod formed a committee in 1977 to begin revising the most recent revision of the hymnal. The committee did not begin its work until 1989. This committee was chaired by James W. Crawford, who was pastor of Boston's Old South Church at that time.

The resulting new hymnal was approved and published in 1995. This hymnal was intended for use beyond the year 2000, and was, of course, entitled the New Century Hymnal. When it was published, the New Century Hymnal was approved by the UCC general synod as the only official hymnal of the UCC. The New Century Hymnal combines a variety of musical styles and includes music in several different languages. The intention of the New Century Hymnal was to provide more inclusive language for both traditional and new hymns that reflect current social justice issues for congregational singing.

The Hymns of Truth and Light was published in 1998 and was created by the First Congregational Church of Houston, Texas. This hymnal was created in response to the other hymnals available but included even more revisions of the texts of hymns that had been published prior to 1958. Spearheaded by a group of Unitarian Universalists, the Hymns of Truth and Light included further culturally diverse musical repertoire, contemporary music, and a variety of musical styles and genres. This hymnal features themes of enlightenment and the search for truth that draws from a variety of philosophical ideologies. In general, this hymnal was intended to appeal to a modern audience who might be seeking spiritual exploration.

Each of these hymnals serves a unique role in their respective faith communities, reflecting differing theological perspectives and cultural contexts. The "Pilgrim Hymnal" offers a foundation of traditional worship, the "New Century Hymnal" pushes for inclusivity and social relevance, and "Hymns of Truth and Light" embraces a broad, pluralistic approach to spirituality. Together, they represent a rich tapestry of contemporary hymnody, catering to diverse worship needs and styles.

VISIONING DISCUSSIONS

Notes from the **Second Hour meeting on October 20th, 2024**. United Congregational Church of Haddam and Higganum. Discussion of the visioning process.

Attendance: John and Liz Anderson, John and Barry Edmondson, Carol Ricker, Sandy Nightingale. Alan and Lori Chadwick, Nancy Soneson. Lindamae Peck, Linda Hansen, Glen Stebbins, Judy Hodgson, Kate Rizzo, Sue Henehan and Greg Shields. Brief appearance by Brian Fraser.

Greg led the discussion. Greg gave a brief overview of the process leading to the report.

- 1. The team studied scriptures
- 2. Looked at Demographics
- 3. Engaged In conversations with community leaders
- (See appendix for details of the above)

all in an effort to better understand how we can adapt to the changing needs and develop a "Purpose statement."

Two examples were included in the Summary Report

Open discussion was lively and everyone contributed.

Greg asked for thoughts on "Why We exist"

Katie Rizzo offered that for her, the fellowship is important. A place for getting centered. (or recalibrate as someone mentioned) And doing things together for others. A reminder that our own problems are minor in the big picture.

Alan suggested that it was to do God's work, acting as disciples, using Jesus as our model.

Liz explained that the sanctuary is important. It is a place to get together and in touch with God, with people who are like minded, and a way to get back to knowing what is important.

John Edmondson offered that when we go through the rest of the week, and all that is going on in the world, Sunday is a celebration.

The role of Worship was discussed and the importance of Community, Message and Music. Even with the many different religious backgrounds of our members, all are welcome. Where are the children? Passing the Peace was discussed with mixed reactions. For now, especially going into flu season it is on hold.

Greg asked the question, where does charity fit in? The story of the Good Samaritan was brought up. And the fact that we can do more as a group than we can as individuals.

Judy offered the act of Paying it forward, and shared the story of how the Salvation Army helped her mother's family during the depression, and then her mother making donations back to them when they were on their feet, and so she continues to do that.

Greg next asked us to discuss the role of Music in worship.

This part of the discussion was rich with ideas and thoughts of how important music is to bringing others in. The need to bring in diversity of music while keeping traditional hymns that bring comfort to many. Lots of inspiring experiences were shared and a consensus that budgeting needs to be increased to achieve these ideas. The meeting was adjourned at about 11:30.
