# A Message from the Pastor



Hello my friends,

We are now deep into the heart of our Epiphany journey, where we consider the Light that has come into the world and how to bring our gifts into the Body of Christ.

As I write this, I am looking out my window in the peaceful parsonage in Higganum, witnessing the exquisite beauty of snow-laden trees. Our first significant snowstorm has clothed Haddam in a beautiful fresh white garment.

Though you will be reading this sometime later, I am writing on this enormously symbolic day: It is Martin Luther King Day, and it is Presidential Inauguration Day.

Beyond our town, so many things are happening; it is beyond comprehension. Fires in LA are about 50% contained. President Biden is welcoming President Trump into the White House. A divisive cease-fire has been called in the Middle East, and Gazans are returning to their devastated homes. We are on day 1061 of the Russian-Ukraine war.

There is so much conflict in our world. We have so much uncertainty and so many divided perspectives combatting for "truth". Yet a feeling of peace envelops our community as the sun is shining Divine Light on the fluffy snow. Everything is covered with sparkling white renewal and a feeling of peace.

Many are wondering, how can we stand firmly committed to our faith and the ideals of Epiphany when we see the pain and suffering rampant and raging all around us. Looking at this beauty, I am filled with faith, joy, and hope.

I believe our faith is the only firm stance from which to view the world and its suffering. We can stand firmly on our faith because Jesus came to our world during times of trouble and is available to those who are suffering. Jesus came for the broken and the brokenhearted. Jesus proclaimed healing to a diversity of people and sent his apostles forward to engage a diversity of perspectives. They shared their diversity of gifts, all striving to share in the Body of Christ.

In holding to our faith during our Epiphany journey, moments of beauty, such as this winter storm, remind me to bring Christ's message of hope into my heart to share with others. In the Epiphany journey, it is the beauty of the star shining brightly in the sky that calls us together. Seeking the star, we are also seeking to figure out how to bring our diverse gifts into this Body, as the wisemen brought their gifts to the Christ child.

The Epiphany journey calls us to travel alongside others who may or may not share our language, culture, or understanding. Christ sent his disciples out in this same way. The Epiphany journey calls us to share our light and our gifts with others. This is why we study the early church during Epiphany and remember the lives of those who first attempted to build up the Body of Christ: to help us learn how to do so today, in 2025!

From the earliest days of the church, what binds us together in this journey is simply that we are seeking this light together. We are following this beautiful and mysteriously promising star together. Its light calls to our childlike innocence and our deepest hopes of what life is "supposed to be." Its light brings a message of promise to our innate yearnings for peace, justice, love, joy, goodness, and hope, to reign in our world.

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The light does not give us all the answers, nor does it solve all our problems. The light shines upon good and evil equally. Hopefully, when we "see the light," it can help us understand some of our own errors, bringing contrition to our hearts and helping us to grow beyond our past mistakes. For we can newly see our own human frailty and bring ourselves into the light of redemption.

Hopefully, this light also brings forgiveness into our hearts, for ourselves and others. As we face and forgive the human frailty of ourselves and of others, new possibilities begin to be uncovered. Growth, healing, and salvation are possible.

Simply by seeking this Divine Light together, we are already healing; we are already walking upon a path of redemption and salvation together. This is church.

In all circumstances, whether it is war or conflict with others or inner conflict such as anxiety, depression, addiction, or mental illness, we are still free to seek the star and reach for its Divine Light.

In all circumstances, we can begin our Epiphany journey. Even if we lack faith and have no knowledge of Christ, still we respond to the radiance of Divine Light and take a step toward it. We can begin our Epiphany journey wherever we stand, with the smallest step toward the light.

As we follow the light, sharing with others and giving our gifts into this body, we become church. In striving to bring our gifts into the Body, we are becoming the hands of Christ's love in the world, here and now. We are becoming the living Word. By inviting Christ to dwell in our hearts to guide us to the light, we begin to become living witnesses to Christ's redemption and salvation. This brings us closer to the light and inspires us to continue on this journey of faith.

Together, when we dwell in the hope and idealistic optimism of seeking the star, we are on our Epiphany journey. To travel this path is an act of faith that has a profound impact on our experience of the world around us and a profound impact on those we meet along the way. This is a way that God is still speaking, through us, into the pain and suffering of the world.

My prayer for us in this midwinter moment is that we each be ignited by the hope of the star and decide that this is the journey we want to travel. May we continue to walk toward the light, together, loving God and neighbor as we find them on this journey to light. May we each learn to discern how to give our gifts into the Body of Christ as we travel together. Together, may we continue to affirm that, especially in times like these, Divine Light can bring salvation, redemption, and hope into the world. May we celebrate that God continues to give us ways to be on this journey, in our hearts, in all circumstances.
