Message from the Pastor

Dear Friends,

Many of you may have heard by now that a bat flew into our last visioning meeting, startling the bejesus out of me and sending me in search of a bat expert to foster its rehabilitation. As a person who sees God's love in all creatures and seeks to understand God's spiritual

meaning of unexpected encounters, I have been pondering spiritual interpretations of a "bat visitation" in our visioning process.

The bat is such a different creature from ourselves, conjuring fears, myths, and legends across centuries and cultures. I admit, it was challenging to overlook its fearsome appearance to see it as a strange neighbor in need of aid, beloved by God. Its dramatic entrance and swooping flight awakened primal fears: fears of the bat itself, of the unknown, of the mystery of its appearance, fears of disease, of not knowing how to meet its needs, fears of its mystery.

How wonderful it was for me to discover a bat specialist in our area, equipped to take the bat, and nurture it back to its community! What a relief to pass it on to her! It was as though God liberated me from my fears, saying, "All is well. You don't need to do everything yourself. I am here. The Body of Christ *is*."

Before we fully forget the bat, let's ponder its spiritual interpretations together.

In Mesoamerican tribal rituals, bats symbolized death and rebirth. The fact that bats live in caves and hibernate resonates both as a symbol of passing through death to resurrection and a symbol of deep healing in the unconscious.

In Gothic architecture, bat-inspired gargoyles were used as spiritual protections in the building of churches to guard these buildings from all evil forces. They were incorporated as ornaments on the drainage flow of rainwater, so that drain water spouted from their mouths, making a gurgling sound. As water is a symbol of the Holy Spirit and baptism, this bathed the building in continual spiritual protection and inspired awe in those who entered.

My prayer for us is that we store these ideas in our hearts, pondering our concepts of death, resurrection, deep healing of Christ, and spiritual protection. How do these concepts relate to our visioning process as we stand together, building our common vision for the future?

May God add illumination and joy to our thoughts and prayers,

CWS Hygiene Kit Collection

In the face of natural disasters, violence, or grinding poverty, hygiene kits can mean the difference between sickness and health for struggling families.

Supplies needed for one kit:

- o One 1-gallon Ziploc bag
- o 3.4 oz shampoo
- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb removed from the package (at least 6" of teeth)
- o One fingernail or toenail clipper
- One bath-size bar of soap in the original package
- One toothbrush in the package
- o 3.4 oz toothpaste
- o 3.4 oz stick deodorant
- o 3.4 oz lotion

It is hard to believe that the month of March is already upon us and very soon we will enter the season of Lent. Lent is a time of solemn reflection as we prepare for Holy Week and Easter. On a personal note, Lent has always represented a time to reflect on why we come to church and celebrate as a community. Jesus spent 40 days alone in the desert, but we are fortunate that we are able to celebrate Lent together.

In preparation for Lent as a church musician, I have always contemplated how to represent what Lent should sound like. As part of my own education, I had many opportunities to learn about and perform many musical selections from a variety of time periods and cultures. I have determined that different people have created different sounds based on the time they lived in, the values that were held at that time, and the resources they had available. I am pleased to say that I have always found beauty in the variety of ways that music can express emotion. Lent is a perfect example of that emotional expression.

Liturgical music during Lent plays a vital role in creating a reflective and penitential atmosphere for worship. Lent, a season of prayer, fasting, and repentance, is marked by a shift in musical style and tone. Hymns and anthems during this time tend to be more somber and introspective, reflecting the themes of sacrifice, reflection, and spiritual renewal. The use of certain musical elements, such as quieter tones, minor keys, and slower tempos, helps to emphasize the solemnity of the season.

In selecting music for Lent, I worked closely with our worship team and choir but also strove to select a variety of different sounds. Although Lent is definitely a more somber time, I hope you will hear that our music selections still represent a varied repertoire, representing a variety of times and cultures. I have selected music that is representative of the themes of self-reflection, simplicity, honesty, and above all, a feeling of being welcomed to the church. Church music during Lent invites worshippers to enter more deeply into the spiritual journey of the season, preparing hearts and minds for the joy of Easter. Each week, our service begins with the statement "No matter who you are or where you are on your spiritual journey, you are welcome here." My hope is that our musical selections throughout the year, especially during Lent, help to express that sentiment.




